Board and Office Bearers During the Period:

One Trustee resigned from the Board during this reporting period i.e. Bernie Hewitt citing no longer interested in the Forum's activities. He was commended for his services to the Forum as a Dance Music Ambassador and Treasurer from 2017 until 2023.

GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Background and Context

Based on concerns by many people in the Scottish traditional dance world that it was not getting the profile and promotion it should, an initial meeting of group representatives and individual practitioners was convened in April 2012 in Edinburgh, assisted by Voluntary Arts Scotland.

At this gathering, it was agreed to form the Traditional Dance Forum of Scotland (TDFS) with an initial steering group to go through the set-up process. Also agreed was that the forum would be grassroots 'bottom-up' rather than 'top-down' structure with a primary focus on advocacy, support and collaboration - bringing together different groups and individuals in their local, national and international contexts.

The Steering Group produced a Constitution, which was adopted at the Inaugural General Meeting of the TDFS in November 2013. An application was subsequently made for incorporation as a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO), which was accepted in September 2014.

Part of this process is working in conjunction with the Traditional Music Forum and Scottish Storytelling Forum through the collective Traditional Arts and Culture Scotland (TRACS) as a vehicle for appropriate joint activity and advocacy. This arrangement is also providing administrative support to the TDFS.

Governance Structure

TDFS is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) regulated by OSCR and governed by the Constitution as agreed by the Forum in General Meeting; motions passed by the Forum in the General Meetings.

The Board of Trustees is the governing body of the Forum. The Board holds regular meetings and generally controls and supervises the activities of the Forum, in particular, the Board is responsible for monitoring the financial position of the Forum.

Appointment of Trustees

Elections are held annually by the Forum in the General Meeting. A person must be a member of the Forum in order to stand for election to the Board. The members of the Board can, however, increase the expertise available to the Forum by co-opting relevant non-members and/or members. At each Annual General Meeting, one third of the Trustees are subject to retirement by rotation but shall be eligible for re-election provided they have not served as a Trustee for six consecutive years.

Membership

Membership is open to all organisations and individuals supporting the objects of the Forum.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Charitable Purpose

The Forum's objectives are:

The advancement of the arts, heritage, and culture by promoting Scottish culture through Scottish dance style(s), dances of Scottish origin or other related traditional and social dance established in Scotland, thereby, to get more people dancing.

The Forum seeks to achieve this by Forum membership and three main routes of support:

Festivals, Productions and Residencies with the aim to:

- Foster local, national and international activity
- Encourage and undertake relevant research
- Encourage the development and maintenance of archives of relevant material
- Act as a voice for traditional dance

- Celebrate diversity and sharing traditions
- Support and enable communication, involving both network development and information dissemination

The Forum seeks to achieve its aims through:

Festivals: including organising / supporting workshops, public events and conferences; supporting trainers, educators and facilitators; connecting networks through awareness raising and collaboration

Productions: including help develop the accessibility of research and archive material through producing dance theatre show for the stage and screen

Residencies: including developing and promoting educational resources and providing advice and linking people to various aspects of support and mentorship in diverse settings from primary schools to national dance centres

MAIN ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS DURING THE YEAR (1 April 2024–31 March 2025)

The main activities and achievements of the Forum over this reporting period are summarised at Annex A.

Summary of Accounts for the Period ending 31 March 2025

The Summary of Accounts is attached.

This has been a good year for the Forum, with several significant developments. Throughout the financial year the full-time Curator (contracted and paid for by TRACS) has brought considerable curatorial expertise, including fundraising, project management and event organisation experience. Her efforts with the support of the Convenor and other Trustees have raised over £38,000 in grants and corporate sponsorship for specific projects, as well as over £7,000 in earned income and donations from these projects. The contribution from TRACS this year is negligible at £261. This represents a sustainable turn towards diversifying the Forum's income streams.

The Trustees also agreed that membership of the Forum should continue to be free for the immediate future. This was for two main reasons:

To encourage more people to join or to continue as members in the current strained financial times.

To allow the Curator more time to concentrate on fundraising rather than administering membership subscriptions, and this has proven to be very cost effective.

Several members who had set up standing orders in the past have continued to pay these, and these funds, with the consent of the members concerned, will be held over until such time as membership subscriptions are re-introduced.

The Forum overall has been much more active than previous years as can be seen from the significant changes in income and expenditure on Projects (including Productions, Residencies and Festivals), as well as Earned Income and donations from projects such as ***Pomegranates, Ceilidh Plus, Elegies, Trad Dance Cast, The Bright Fabric of Life, 10 out of 10, D is for Dance and ReFashion.***

There is currently an excess of Income over Expenditure in the Restricted funds. This is all earmarked for projects and events which will be taking place in the financial year 2025/26.

The £13,298 Miscellaneous Income came primarily from the corporate sponsorship campaign towards the production of the new screen dance entitled ***The Bright Fabric of Life.***

Risk

TDFS is not exposed to any significant financial risk other than underlying structural uncertainties in our relationship with TRACS, including the employment of our Curator who is contracted and paid by TRACS, rather than TDFS. To mitigate this risk we will seek further legal advice and clarity.

There is a potential risk of improper use of donations, subscriptions or grants received. To mitigate this risk, all funds are carefully monitored and allocated in line with the purposes for which they have been provided.


During this period the Trustees also maintained Public Liability, Professional Indemnity and Trustee's Liability insurance.

A reserve of £1,000 has been maintained in order to cover any administrative costs should the charity be wound up for any reason.

3-30 APRIL 2024

Ahead of our flagship **Pomegranates Festival** we unveiled **Dance Around the World** - a new exhibition of Scottish and world trad dance books and artefacts, curated specifically for the Edinburgh Central Library. Free and open to all, it featured over 100 items on loan from public and private collections, showcasing over 20 different traditions from Scotland, Greece, Estonia, Poland, Bali, Japan and beyond.

20 APRIL 2024

Ahead of our Pomegranates Festival weekend, we held our annual intensive of continuous professional development for dancers. Packed with 12 workshops led by dance artists based in Scotland: **Evie Waddell** (Scottish Step and Gaelic Song), **Vassio Bouchagiar-Walker** (Rebetiko), **Nadia Khatib** (Dabkeh), **Lara Russo and Inesa Vilavidsite** (Tammunista), **Oca Leoning** (Yiddish), **Niki and Yangyang** (Waltz), **Jack Anderson** (Irish Step), **Yanmei Bowie** (Chinese Classical), **Brigitte Ciciu Juliet** (Indonesian), **Angel Godwin** (American Country Line), **Sabie Madubela** (South African Xhosa) and **Lucia Leeson** (Hip Hop).

23-30 APRIL 2024

We staged our second Pomegranates Festival 2024 exhibition at the Scottish Storytelling Centre Court. It took the media by storm. Entitled **Vengefully Changed Allegiance**, it was **Alison Harm's** first solo exhibition in a public space. It explored the role of tartan in Scottish and Irish trad dance through sustainable fashion costumes, photography and performance.

💡 1 artist-in-residence + 1 sold-out fashion show for 70 participants + 2 co-curators + 10 exhibition tours + 1 commission of 11 trad dance costumes + 1,000 exhibition visitors (estimate)



25 APRIL 2024

We launched our Pomegranates Festival with a lunchtime public talk about **Europeade** - the largest festival of European trad dance, costume and music with 8,000 participants from across the continent, taking place in a different European city every year. The talk was led by **Rüdiger Heß**, President of the Europeade International Committee, as part of his visit to Scotland to explore the prospect of us co-hosting **Europeade in July 2027 in Perth** - the first host opportunity for the UK in the six decades of this festival's history.

27 APRIL 2024

One of the highlights of Pomegranates Festival 2024? Our production **Elegies** - the first dance adaptation of the poetry book **Elegies for the Dead in Cyrenaica (1948)** by **Hamish Henderson**. Set in a dancehall and a desert war theatre, it embodied ceilidh, jive, swing and lindy hop, evoking the popular social dance culture of the 1940s, creating a bridge to the present day. It featured artists **Helen Gould**, **George Adams**, **Nicola Thomson**, **Edwin Wen**, **Morag Anderson**, **Stephen Watt**, **Cera Impala**, **Katie Duxbury** and **Roddy Simpson**, plus co-curators **Jim Mackintosh**, **Ilyana Nedkova** and **Wendy Timmons**.

28 APRIL 2024

Our first Pomegranates Festival Family Sunday celebrated world trad dance while planting the seeds in the hearts and minds of the new generation of trad dancers. The day was packed with trad dance shows, as well as a ceilidh expertly called by **Caroline Brockbank** for all the family, accompanied by live music.

29 APRIL 2024

The finale of our Pomegranates Festival 2024 marked **UNESCO International Dance Day** with a triple bill of poetry, film and dance. The evening culminated with our new hip-hop theatre show **United Nations?** choreographed by our festival resident artist **Jonzi D** who also performed alongside 20 Scotland-based trad dance artists and musicians.

💡 It also featured our 2 co-curators + 2 festival artists-in-residence: **Mona Trade** who premiered her short film commission **Kaige, Joan and Jim Mackintosh** who performed his new poems and launched his latest poetry collection **We are Migrant**.



30 APRIL 2024

The final word at the Pomegranates Festival was had by our artist-in-residence **Jonzi D** who delivered the keynote talk **Decolonising the Expressive Arts Curriculum**, drawing on his illustrious career as an MC, dancer, spoken word artist and educator. He advocated for the recognition of the hip hop disciplines at the vanguard of dance, theatre and formal art education. Jonzi reflected on his professional development projects, including **Open Art Surgery**, through which he has supported hundreds of hip hop dance and rap/poetry artists on their journey to creating theatre.

23 JUL - 29 AUG 2024

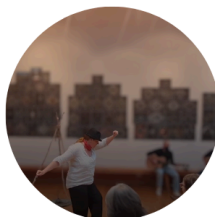
In 2024 we continued with our #tradance campaign, highlighting the contribution of trad dance artists in the programmes of the Edinburgh summer festivals, on a whole new level. We launched our first-of-its-kind **Traditional Dance Criticism Course**, led by dance writer **Roslin O'Brien**. It provided training and editorial support to 6 emerging trad dance critics who authored 15 new reviews of 10 shows with trad dance roots across the Edinburgh's summer festivals, all published on our new platform <https://www.tdfs.org/reviews>

31 JULY 2024

As part of our #tradance campaign at Edinburgh summer festivals we also curated and premiered **Stones are Alive** - a new work-in-progress as part of the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. It was inspired by stories of stones, coins and rebels, including Nikos Kazantzakis' Zorba the Greek and Mairi Campbell's Living Stone. Choreographed and performed by **Vassia Bouchagiar-Walker** to live Rebettiko music, it was showcased at the preview of Campbell's Living Stone exhibition and music theatre project.

20 SEPTEMBER 2024

We were one of the Scottish organisations supporting the third in a series of four UK-wide, hybrid symposia as part of the **Critical Dance Pedagogy Network** aimed at raising awareness of the numerous inequities and injustices in dance and dance education. This third symposium focused on pedagogies and practices.

We ran an open call for participation, presented the pedagogical activities of Traditional Dance Forum of Scotland at the symposium and curated the opening Gaelic song and step dance performance, featuring duo **Eve Waddell** and **Andrew Hemmington**.

20 SEPTEMBER 2024

We teamed up with independent Scottish publishers, Birlinn, for a sold-out double-bill launch of **The Bright Fabric of Life** - our new screen dance production inspired by the new book under the same title by **Mhairi Collie**. Mhairi was joined for the Q&A by author **Alexander McCall Smith** and members of our screen dance team **Mare Tralla**, **Chris Lyons**, **Vincent Hantam**, **Susie Dinan-Young**, **Ilyana Nedkova** and **Wendy Timmons**.
